SIT to Launch its Own Applied Degrees in 2014

Move to develop 'best-in-class' industry specialist a key step in its preparation to becoming Singapore's fifth autonomous university.

Singapore Institute of Technology (SIT) will offer applied degree programmes under its own namesake from 2014 onwards. Since its inception in 2009, SIT has carved a niche education pathway with its practice-oriented degree programmes with strong industry links. Through close consultation with key industry players, SIT has identified industry sectors with strong demand for graduates. In just four short years, SIT's annual intake has expanded to 1,500 students in 27 full-time degree programmes, offered in partnership with 11 reputable overseas universities.

As Singapore's fifth autonomous university, SIT will help open more pathways to higher education for Singaporeans. It will continue to expand and leverage its strong industry links to award applied degrees in its own name, in addition to the partnerships it already has with overseas university partners.

The three new degree programmes to be offered from Academic Year 2014/15 are the Bachelor of Engineering (Honours)/ Master of Engineering Technology (MEngTech) in Sustainable Infrastructure Engineering, Bachelor of Engineering (Honours) in Information and Communications Technology and the Bachelor of Accountancy (Honours).

The Bachelor of Engineering (Honours) in Sustainable Infrastructure Engineering is the first of its kind in Singapore. The role of engineers to support Singapore's economic growth and development needs in terms of first-world infrastructure is critical as Singapore positions itself as a global transportation hub. SIT's response to industry demand is to create a niche engineering programme that will offer highly-specialised training closely aligned with the needs of the sector.

SIT will also launch the Bachelor of Engineering (Honours) in Information and Communications Technology (ICT) programme with specialisation in Software Engineering, as well as a Bachelor of Accountancy (Honours) programme. This will support Singapore's needs for graduate talent in the ICT and financial sectors.

Integrated Work Study Programme

SIT will pilot its Integrated Work Study Programme (IWSP) through its new applied degrees. To be held over a span of 8 to 12 months, the IWSP is a unique blend of full-time work and study where students will be able to gain real work experience through the course of their studies and apply classroom learning in their immediate work environments. The structure of each IWSP will be unique to its degree programme. Typically however, they will be of a longer duration than other internships so as to cater to different industry needs and allow a fuller learning stint.



News of SIT introducing its own degrees made it to major newspapers.

Designed to be more in-depth and structured than a traditional internship or industrial attachment, students participating in the IWSP will not only gain real work experience and insights into working life, they will also receive remuneration that is in line with contractual work. SIT has received positive response from organisations such as the Infocomm Development Authority of Singapore, Land Transport Authority, transport companies such as SBS Transit and SMRT Corporation, accounting firms such as PricewaterhouseCoopers and RSM Chio Lim, and many others who are keen to partner with SIT on the IWSP.

Industry Advisory Committee

Industry Advisory Committees (IAC) to guide curricula development for each of the degree programmes have also been formed by SIT. The IACs comprise key industry leaders who will give feedback and advice on the development of the respective degree programmes. Through such close industry consultation, SIT will be able to ensure the relevance of its programmes by continually aligning its degree curricula with evolving industry needs.

Prof Tan Thiam Soon, President, SIT, said, "This is a very proud moment for SIT. We have come a long way with our overseas university partners. With the launch of our own industry-focused degree programmes, we will continue to be steadfast in our promise to offer quality degree programmes to our students. I am very excited that through our degree programmes, we will produce highly employable graduates imbued with the SIT DNA. Our students will be equipped with deep specialist skills to become 'thinking tinkerers' and strong industry advocates."

"I am confident that SIT's Integrated Work Study Programme will help our students take off in their careers as they will have the unique opportunity to augment theory with real work experience. SIT will remain in close consultation with industry to ensure that our curriculum is continually refreshed and industry-relevant."

As our new graduates get ready to enter the world of work, SITizen asks Prof Tan Thiam Soon, President, SIT, to share some of his tips for success

Q: What do you think may be the greatest challenges coming up against SIT graduates as they start their careers? How different is the working world of the 21st Century compared to, say, the time when you were a new graduate?

A: The result of rapid economic and technological progress has increased competition and complexity in all sectors of our economy. This almost exponential increase impacts both our education system and graduates alike. The openness of the global marketplace further strips away barriers to competition, and our graduates are now facing the brunt of intense competitiveness on all fronts. Transnational borders to human capital are disappearing; the number of Singapore-nurtured graduates is rising significantly each year with the recent increase in the number of tertiary institutions. It is an infinitely more competitive market for our graduates today than it was in my time. Furthermore, all of them will enter a market that is changing at break-neck pace.

Employers are now increasingly aware of the differences between graduates of different universities; they also seek polytechnic graduates and university graduates for different skill sets. While this may sound challenging, it actually presents an opportunity for our SIT graduates, who embody the best attributes of both.

I am very proud of our workplace-friendly graduates. They are willing to roll up their sleeves to get things done, able to find practical solutions and are highly adaptable. They have also benefitted from the rigorous curriculum at SIT which has equipped them with state-of-the-art professional know-how.

This bodes well for them at a time when new growth sectors such as logistics, allied health and sustainable infrastructure engineering are emerging. They have what it takes to seize the opportunities in these sectors. All the 27 degree programmes we offer with our 11 overseas university partners are designed to build the expertise that are needed to help industries grow.

Despite these advantages, our graduates will still have to cope with great and rapid changes. In the 21st century, constant change in the economy is inevitable and jobs will come and go. SIT graduates will have to be resourceful, innovative and hungry for success. Most importantly, they will have to embrace change and effectively evolve with the times to attain their fullest potential in their careers.

Q: How can they stand out from the competition?

A: By exercising three key abilities, or what I like to call the SIT DNA. The first is the ability to be thinking tinkerers who are adaptable, resourceful, and know how to think through doing. The second is the ability to accept change courageously and to learn on the job. For example, I hope that our graduates prove to be the most ideal candidates for companies that need to re-locate or start ventures in a new territory. The third is the ability to learn, unlearn and relearn. The first two are less difficult, but unlearning is about one's mindset. Unlearning does not mean forgetting what has been learnt, but accepting that knowledge has become obsolete. It is about embracing change and this is necessary because while formal education lasts about 15 years, the working life is going to be three times longer.

Q: What memorable life lessons can you share with our new graduates?

A: Change was the only constant in my own learning journey and learning to thrive in spite of it has been a most valuable lesson for me. When I was growing up in a *kampong* in Jurong, Singapore was in the first years of its nation building and English was becoming the first language. I was the first of seven children in my family to go to an English-stream secondary school, so acquiring proficiency in a new first language was a fundamental change and major challenge.

Subsequently, after my 'A Levels,' I found myself facing new cultures and different learning environments. I went to the University of Canterbury in New Zealand on a Colombo Plan scholarship before going onto the California Institute of Technology in the United States to earn my postgraduate degrees. All these were difficult changes, but they also resulted in rewarding experiences which have taught me resilience, flexibility and the openness to new ideas.

You could say that mine is the 'classic Singapore story,' in which it is possible for a *kampong* boy to attend top global universities and transform his family's future. I have learnt through first-hand experiences that education is the greatest agent for personal transformation and social change. This is another valuable lesson that I find to be true to this day.

Q: What would be the right attitude for SIT graduates to adopt as they enter the workplace?

A: You must be willing to work your way up from the bottom. The experience will give you the advantages of a broader perspective, the understanding of the entire work process, and the insights as to what is possible and what is not.

In some cases, this would mean actually getting one's hands dirty. I learnt this early. When I was a boy, my family ran a pig farm where Jurong Point now stands and I had to help my parents clean it up.

Also, in life, when one door closes, another one opens. Many become disappointed because they believe the door that closes is the better one. The truth is no one knows because it depends on what you do with it. So it is important to put in your 100% for the door that opens to you.

My specialisation is in land reclamation, deep excavation, soil improvement and soil characterization. When I was a student in New Zealand 37 years ago, I worked a summer job that involved vibrating concrete for the construction of a hydropower dam. I had to hang off a 150-metre cliff to do the job. That gave me quite a view of things!

Q: What do you think is the single most impactful quality to have as one progresses in one's career?

A: To me, that would be graciousness to our co-workers and also to others we come across day to day. Having a razor-sharp mind in this era of the knowledge economy is advantageous; but I believe that it is equally important to have a compassionate heart.

The ability to put oneself in the shoes of others, to understand their motivations and difficulties – that would be an enduring strength in the workplace and also in all other areas of one's life.

In the 21st century, knowledge can become obsolete quite quickly, but a good understanding of the human condition has no expiry date. I hope all SIT graduates will continue to cultivate this single most important quality through life.

SIT Students Get Increasing Support from Private Donors

Philanthropic support for students has grown since the first cohort was admitted in 2010.

From a starting base of zero in 2010, private donors have since made gifts to Singapore Institute of Technology (SIT) to establish six scholarships to encourage excellence, 12 bursaries and study grants in aid of students facing financial difficulties and 19 performance awards such as outstanding student awards, gold medals and book prizes to recognise good academic performance.

There is now even an emergency fund to assist full-time SIT students who encounter unforeseen financial emergencies or personal catastrophes that may prevent them from continuing their education and graduating from SIT. The Xiao De (孝德) Emergency fund was made possible by a donor who wishes to remain anonymous.

Some of these gifts are endowed to benefit SIT students in perpetuity. What this means is that only the income generated by such gifts will be disbursed to recipients leaving the initial capital sum untouched, continuing to generate on-going income.

Another interesting point to note is that all private gifts to SIT attract a Government Matching Grant which in effect multiplies the sum bestowed.

So far, a total of 122 SIT students have benefitted as scholarship holders, performance award winners, bursary and grant recipients. Supported by philanthropic giving, these awards are bond-free.

While the total quantum of private gifts that SIT has received to date is as yet modest, the growing interest from donors is an encouraging start for a new institution in its formative years.

Prof Tan Thiam Soon, President, SIT, said, "We are very grateful for this support from private donors. Their giving toward scholarships and awards to recognise good academic performance will encourage our students to fulfil their greatest potential."

"The gifts toward student financial aid are especially crucial for many talented SIT students who come from disadvantaged backgrounds. More than three quarters of our students who matriculated in the Academic Year 2013 come from households

Architecture, the Choo Chiau Beng Overseas Immersion Programme Scholarship Fund, and the Choo Chiau Beng Bursary at SIT.

Said Mr Choo, "I hope the outstanding student award will encourage deserving students to strive for academic excellence, and that the scholarship will enable them to access a quality specialist education that gives them international exposure through a good Overseas Immersion Programme. In time, the industries will also benefit from

with a per capita income (PCI) that is below the 2012 National Median PCI of S\$2,130. Such gifts help ensure that all deserving students are able to access a quality education, regardless of their financial circumstances."

Donors are now not only giving more, they are also taking a deeper interest in the students they support. More donors are now attending donor stewardship events (organised all year round by SIT's Advancement & Alumni Division) where they get to meet their student beneficiaries face to face, and vice versa.

Among these donors is Mr Choo Chiau Beng, whose philanthropic support has made possible the Choo Chiau Beng Outstanding Student Award in Naval having workplace-ready, practice-oriented and globally-oriented talents to drive their growth."

"It is important that we nurture a diverse pool of talents to fuel our economy and encourage upward social mobility. Giving to education is an investment for the future that will transform society and I am happy to support outstanding and deserving students at SIT."

On 23 Aug 2013, students from the hospitality disciplines and representatives from 14 companies came together at M Hotel for the SIT Hospitality Day 2013.

The event featured a speed-networking event, where graduating students could interview for available positions with hotels and F&B groups. Small-group discussions were also organised for students to find out more about the industry from captains of the industry. The event was supported by the Culinary Institute of America, University of Nevada, Las Vegas, and the Employment and Employability Institute.

In his welcome address, Prof Yee Fook Cheong, Vice President (External Relations), SIT, said, "The importance of the tourism industry to our economy underscores the need to maintain our competitive edge in providing world-class hospitality services. The key to achieving this is to continually raise the service standards of our hospitality workforce through experiential learning and practical training by dedicated hospitality institutions."

This was followed by a panel sharing with industry partners. Panel speakers Ms Catherine Ang, Director, Human Capital & Development, Pan Pacific Singapore, Mr Benny Se Teo, Founder & Chef of Eighteen Chefs, and Mr Yeoh Teng Kwong, Managing Director of Grapevine Concepts covered everything from global trends in the tourism industry to the skills that employers in the industry are looking for.

The first Singaporean to train at Jamie Oliver's restaurant Fifteen, Chef Benny Se Teo shared his inspiring story on how he went on to start Eighteen Chefs as a social enterprise to help former inmates like himself gain employment.

Honourable Start to a 'Life in Crime'

SIT and UoL partner up to offer new 3-year honours degree in Criminology and Security.

On 2 Aug 2013, a signing ceremony was held at the Senior Police Officers' Mess to commemorate the partnership between Singapore Institute of Technology (SIT), University of Liverpool (UoL) and Temasek Polytechnic in offering the Bachelor of Arts with Honours in Criminology and Security degree programme.

Mr S. Iswaran, Minister, Prime Minister's Office and Second Minister for Home Affairs and Trade & Industry witnessed the signing ceremony. The occasion also saw 32 Home Team officers awarded full sponsorship by the Ministry of Home Affairs for their degree.

The new degree will support the growth of Singapore as a safety and security hub by raising the overall level of professionalism of the security industry and helping to meet the demand for trained security personnel. The partnership between SIT and UoL will draw on SIT's expertise in designing niche degree programmes which acknowledge such strong industry demand.

The three-year full-time degree course offers an integrated and comprehensive study into criminological theories and research methodologies that includes modules such as Social Change and Social Policy in Contemporary Society as well as Understanding Crime, Justice and Punishment. Localised case studies will be used to equip the students with a deeper understanding of security, social control and non-conventional threats from a critical perspective. Some modules like Terrorism and Radicalism will also be adapted to the South East Asian context.

Said Prof Tan Thiam Soon, President, SIT, "I am delighted that SIT stands in good stead in offering industry-relevant degree programmes. Our partnership with University of Liverpool is a testament of our mission to continuously offer degrees which cater to the needs of the industry through close consultation with our partners. I am honoured that Ministry of Home Affairs has given strong industry support and endorsement for this degree programme. SIT is cognizant of the need to progressively offer other niche programmes that will benefit our society

and economy, and will continue to create such opportunities."

The UoL is SIT's newest partner to provide relevant and targeted programmes for students in Singapore. This brings the total of SIT's degree offerings with its overseas university partners to 27.

Prof Fiona Beveridge, UoL's Head of School of Law and Social Justice, said, "The Department of Sociology, Social Policy and Criminology at the University of Liverpool is one of the oldest Sociology Departments in the UK and has a long and distinguished history of research-led teaching. This new programme continues the academic rigour and reputation of our Liverpool-based courses, adapted to the needs of Singapore, and will be delivered by lecturers who are at the cutting edge of their discipline."

"The Bachelor of Arts with Honours in Criminology and Security will produce a pool of graduates ... who can think critically about crime and security issues and help to shape future policy and practice in Singapore and further afield."

SIT welcomed its first intake the full-time degree programme for the Academic Year 2013/14 in September this year with a class of about 40 students. Temasek Polytechnic is the host for this degree programme and classes will be conducted there.

The little robots constructed by a group of SIT-UoG graduands from the pioneer cohort of the BEng (Hons) Mechatronics degree programme were a big hit at the Singapore Science Festival 2013.

The students, who had a booth at the Festival, modelled the robots after real NASA robots operating in space; albeit theirs were constructed entirely out of LEGO.
