The two final-year students at the Singapore Institute of Technology (SIT) were among the Mapletree Bursary recipients of Academic Year 2014/15 who got to meet Mapletree Investments Pte Ltd's (Mapletree) corporate leaders on 11 March 2015. "Despite being busy with school work and co-curricular activities, I would have to work at banquets occasionally in the evenings after classes to maintain a consistent cash-flow. Therefore, I was not able to focus completely on my studies then. However, now ... I am able to commit more of my time into assignments during this final semester," she said, adding, "Thank you for making a difference in my life, and in the lives of my fellow recipients here today!"

Mr Cheng, who spoke at the event, noted that with SIT, even more applied courses were being made available within Singapore's university landscape to cater to students with technical interests. "More importantly, this will also offer greater options to polytechnic graduates looking to continue their academic pursuits and seeking tertiary qualifications," he pointed out.



He added, "At Mapletree, we believe that access to education, including tertiary education, should not be limited to only those who can afford it. It is our hope that our contributions to education will enable more individuals to realise their dreams and gain social mobility.
